Seminarian Frank Hanincik Ordained to Minor Orders

"[I] perceive that I am being called by almighty God to the clerical state, and therefore, in response to that vocation, of my own volition, with no other consideration than the glory of God through service to His holy Church and the attainment of my own salvation, and with the ultimate intention of being promoted to the Sacred Order of the Holy Priesthood, do hereby present my petition..." With these words, Seminarian Frank Hanincik petitioned Bishop Andrew for the privilege of ordination to the orders of Candle Bearer and Lector and Cantor. Only after discernment, and the seminarian's serious desire to take this first step toward ordination to the Holy Priesthood, does the Bishop grant the petitioner's request.

On Sunday October 7, 2007, Seminarian Frank Hanincik was ordained to the first of the minor orders for the Eparchy of Passaic. Bishop Andrew presided over the ordination, held at the Monastery of Our Lady of Mariapoch in Mattawan, New Jersey, and concelebrated by 18 priests of the Eparchy. Frank's parents, sister and other family members, along with Fr. John and several St. Ann parishioners, were in attendance. As a sign of the ordinand giving himself completely to the service of the Church, and of his humility in the face of one day acting for Christ in the Liturgy, the Bishop cut a lock of Seminarian Frank's hair in the shape of a cross. Beginning with that moment, Frank's service to the Church – and the world – is also called to take the shape of the Cross.

Lector Frank grew up in Hazleton, PA with his parents, Frank and Dolores, and younger sister Ann. The possibility of a vocation to priesthood was present from the beginning of his life. At his baptism at St. Mary Greek Catholic Church, Msgr. George Koval said to Dolores: "I have a feeling about this little boy. He will do something good one day." As a boy Frank showed signs of a call that he would answer many years later.

A Visit to the Orphanages in Zakarpattia

Christine Smith traveled with Sr. Bernarda to Ukraine to visit the orphanages. While Christine was in Ukraine, she visited eight orphanages both state run and church sponsored. She also visited 5 shelters which included a TB clinic, a home for unwed mothers, and a shelter for runaways.

Christine's mission for her trip from August 14-September 1, 2007 was to take nutritious food to as many orphanages as

she could. With the money that was collected from our church contributions for her trip, she was able to see over 650 children and provide them with fresh fruit, cookies, rice, macaroni and bananas which was a delicacy. This food was a treat since their general diet consists of potatoes, cabbage, soup, breads, vegetables (in season), and a small amount of meat.

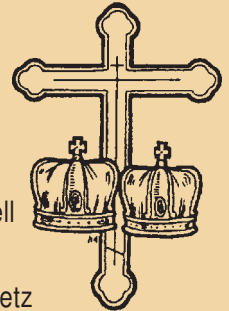

PROTECTING MARRIAGE IN PENNSYLVANIA

Over the years and across cultures and very different religious beliefs, marriage has been and is the foundation of the family. The family, in turn, is the basic unit of society. Thus, marriage is a personal relationship with public significance. Catholic doctrine teaches us that marriage is a sacred union between one man and one woman. This natural institution is rooted in God's divine plan for creation — an exclusive life-long union of one man and one woman joined in an intimate communion of life and love.

What can you do to help

A state constitutional amendment defining marriage as the union of one man and one woman and preventing civil unions will be considered this fall.

The Pennsylvania Catholic Conference (PCC) strongly supports this effort and asks Catholics to contact their local state legislators expressing support. The Committee is creating the following resources for the benefit of our parishioners:

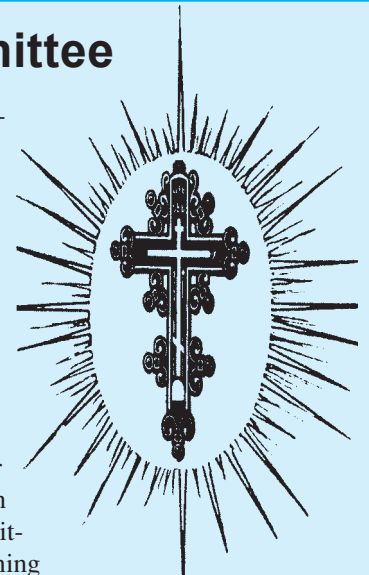
- Live lecture series, discussion panels, discussion groups which will be digitally recorded for future review.

download previously recorded education sessions as MP3 files onto your home computer for later review from your computer or iPod player.

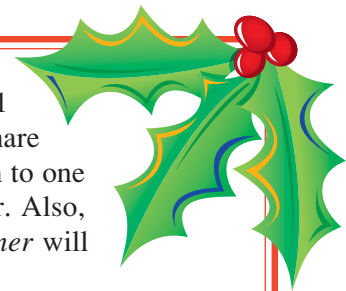

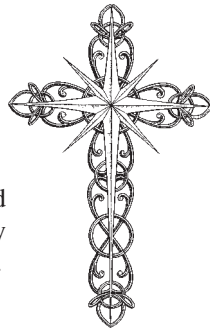

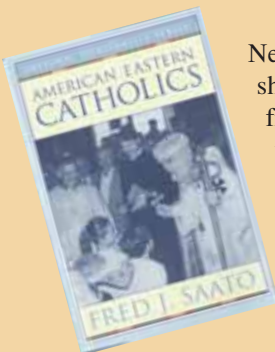
Featured Book Selection — St. Ann Parish Book Store

American Eastern Catholics

This 180-page book written by Fr. Fred J. Saato, a priest of the Melkite Greek Catholic Eparchy of Newton, examines the long and often difficult history of the Eastern Catholic Churches and their relationship, often tenuous, with Rome. The book tells a fascinating tale of the movement of these Churches from their embattled homelands to America and the serious concerns for the languages, cultures and traditions of these ancient faiths.

Although the book is intended to acquaint the non-Eastern Catholic to the history, traditions and practices of our Church the book offers excellent information for the parishioners of St. Ann Church. This year during the Philip’s Fast an adult educational series for the parish is based on the book. These classes presented by Father John began on Wednesday November 14th at 7:30 pm in the church. This book published by Paulist Press can be purchased for \$18.95 in the parish bookstore on the lower level of the Church between liturgies every Sunday. The store also carries a large variety of Icons, Christmas cards, ornaments, religious music, cook books and Christmas wafers or oplatki. .

"I always knew he was special," said Frank's father, "because he used to say Liturgy in the cellar when he was 6 years old." Dolores decorated a pool table with linens and supplied sandwich bread that transformed itself into "pretend" prosphora in young Frank's hands. With a wine goblet painted gold with a stencil of a three-bar cross, the future seminarian – in makeshift vestments – celebrated the Liturgy in imitation of what he saw each Sunday at St. Mary's.

Always committed to his faith ("In college we never had to remind him to go to church; it was something that was just inside him," remembers Dolores), Frank seemed to veer away from a vocation to the priesthood. He received a BS in biology from Penn State, and it seemed that his talents might be fulfilled in the sciences. But the Lord is patient – and persistent – and in 2004 Frank was accepted as a seminarian at SS Cyril and Methodius Seminary in Pittsburgh. Lector Frank now divides his time between

studies at the seminary and at Duquesne University, in addition to his current ministry to inmates of the Allegheny County Jail. "I always think of Frank's unselfishness, says the elder Frank; "how he is the first to help another, to comfort them, to be generous with himself."

The newly ordained Lector is both excited to be on the path toward the priesthood, and humbled: "I am grateful to God, that He called me to serve the Church of Passaic, and to begin this journey toward priesthood." Following the ordination, Bishop Andrew and the people sang *Axios! He is worthy!* For Lector Frank and his family, there is a keen awareness that the worthiness of being a priest comes not from within the man himself, but is a gift from God. God has truly blessed the Hanincik family, and they are thankful that through his *Yes* to God's call, Lector Frank has not only begun a journey toward the priesthood; but he is growing daily into the man God created him to be.

The orphanages Christine visited were well run but very crowded. Christine said it was interesting to see that the facilities in greatest need were the facilities that were teaching the children to be very spiritual. The children said prayers, sang songs, and wrote beautiful poetry. Every orphanage had a chapel where the children could pray.

Christine and Sr. Bernarda met many priests and nuns in various monasteries where they stayed. Also, she visited Fr. Taras, Fr. Ivan, Fr. Alexander (Sasha), and Bishop Milan. All of them shared with her their great appreciation for our church, and they wish us well.

Another highlight of the trip was a visit to our adopted church in Korolevo—the church that the parishioners are building themselves. When Christine visited this church, the parishioners showed her all the work that has been done. Right now the sides of the church are complete as well as part of the roof. They are very appreciative of our monetary donations given to assist with the building of the church.

This was the first time Christine has taken this trip with Sr. Bernarda, who has been visiting the orphanages for 15 years. Christine says this trip was a powerful and emotional experience. The people she met on this journey were very grateful for all the



help they received. She hopes this will be the first of many trips with Sr. Bernarda to Ukraine.

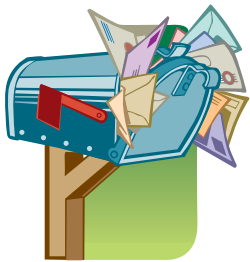
Christine thanks you, our parishioners, and everyone else who supported her. Without your support and encouragement this trip would not have been possible.

During this time of year, our thoughts are turning to the coming Christmas season. For Byzantine Catholics this means that we have entered the time of preparation for the birth of our Lord God, and Savior known as St. Philip's Fast or Filopovka. As we are drawn into all the joyous activities that culminate at the manger, let's take a few minutes to walk the road to Bethlehem with the holy Theotokos by contemplating the icon known as Our Lady of the Sign. In this icon we see our Mother bearing her infant Son in an orb known as a "clipeus" in Greek. It is a representation of the Child that she is now carrying in her womb, the One who will deliver us and save us. It is also an illustration of the prophecy of Isaiah: "The Lord himself, therefore will give you a sign. It is this: the maiden is with child and will soon give birth to a son whom she will call Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14). It's no wonder that this icon plays such an important part in our church during this time of year. Let's walk with Mary as she is carrying her infant Son within her and let's allow Him to grow within us as well until we behold Him lying in the manger and beaming at us for all eternity.



REMEMBER THE SICK — those who are hospitalized, those who are residents in nursing homes, those who in some way are incapacitated, and those who cannot worship with us.
